Tinseltown Talks:

Eddie Muller's case of the missing marshmallow monkey

If reading bedtime stories to the grandkids is a cherished family tradition, Eddie Muller has an unusual tale to share this holiday season: a gritty feline sleuth searches for a stolen artifact while encountering a host of seedy underground characters prowling through a shadowy urban setting.


If that sounds like the plot from 1940s film noir cinema, you're no dope. In his first published children's book, "Kitty Feral and the Case of the Marshmallow Monkey," the Turner Classic Movies (TCM) host has channeled his film noir expertise onto the pages of a new book for kids aged 4 and up.

Toning down the traditionally dark stylized themes from early crime fiction thrillers was a no-brainer for Muller (www.eddiemuller.com) and Running Press Kids publishers (www.runningpress.com). The result is a cute mystery tale with animal characters that cleverly reference popular classic noir films, including one of the best from 1941.

"The Maltese Falcon' seemed a perfect template," said Muller from his home in the San Francisco Bay Area. "Film noir themes revolve around the most diabolical and dastardly motivations that are not suitable for a children's book. But many are detective stories, so the idea of a simple quest, like a treasure hunt, seemed adaptable for kids."

Just like private detective Sam Spade's search for the precious 'Falcon' statuette, Kitty Feral pursues a stolen artifact (a Marshmallow Monkey) and along the way, interacts with some interesting characters, driving the plot. (Kitty is also on a mission to locate kidnapped crimefighting partner Mitch the Mutt).

When originally approached by (coauthor) Jessica Schmidt with the idea, Muller says he jumped at the opportunity provided the artwork would emulate the style of classic noir film. Drawn by Forrest Burdett in glorious noir-ish black-and-white and

While obviously aimed at children, adults familiar with classic movies will enjoy the subtle references to noir films. For instance, Kitty begins the search at the Acme Book Shopsimilar (but naturally less risqué) to a Humphrey Bogart scene right out of 1946's "The Big Sleep."

A dockside warehouse image captures a scene from "99 River Street," a theater marquee acknowledges producer Val Lewton's "Leopard Man," and there are plenty of obvious references to "On the Waterfront," "Casablanca," "Shakedown," and "The Postman Always Rings Twice."

As for the book's cast of supporting characters, rotund owl boss Casper Nighthawk and sleazy Wilmer the Weasel represent villainous Kasper Gutman (Sydney Greenstreet) and Wilmer Cook (Elisha Cook Jr.) from "The Maltese Falcon." Sinister leather-clad Johnny Gila is distinctly reptilian, a nod to William Talman's title role in 1953's "The Hitch-hiker." "People have said he looked like a Gila monster," notes Muller. And

speaking of "Perry Mason" actors, there's even a character representing Raymond Burr's villainous roles (but we'll leave that one for readers to uncover!).


As for Kitty, the character is modeled after actress Ella Raines, especially her sultry role in 1944's "The Phantom Lady," even though Muller doesn't formally acknowledge Kitty's gender in the pages.


"Kitty was clearly inspired by Raines - a smart, independent woman intent on solving a crime herself in the film, not the typical femme fatale character," explained Muller. As a bonus, if reading the story to kids, grandparents can test the youngsters' powers of observation by asking if they can spot something intentionally omitted from the artist's images of Kitty!

Of course, most of the book's film references will be beyond young readers, but Muller thinks adults reading the story to their little ones will enjoy opening up a monochromatic world not usually seen on cellphones, laptops, or while gaming. And, perhaps, some may even come to appreciate the screen imagery in classic films enjoyed by their parents and grandparents.

"Since the book came out, I've attended film festivals that lasted several days and people told me they were buying the book for their grandkids," recalls Muller. "They've returned a second day, reporting they read it to them and that the kids loved it. So that's really gratifying."

Internet Discounts for Seniors

In a survey conducted by Pew Research in 2000, only 14% of people over the age of 65 reported using the internet. Today, that number has jumped to 67%. This significant increase in internet usage amongst seniors shouldn't come as a surprise. Placing online grocery orders, attending virtual doctor visits, and calling loved ones on FaceTime are just some of the ways seniors can enrich their lives with the internet. However, some seniors aren't sold on the idea of adding an extra bill to the pile every month. Luckily, there are plenty of internet discounts for seniors hoping to cut back on their internet payments and avoid unnecessary costs.

Internet discounts for seniors at CenturyLink

While most internet providers don't offer special discounts for seniors, many still have reduced payments for those who qualify for other assistance programs. For example, CenturyLink offers several consumer assistance programs for qualifying customers, such as the Affordable Connectivity Program, Lifeline, and



the Telephone Assistance Program (TAP).

- Connectivity Program provides a discount of up to \$30 per month towards broadband service for eligible households and up to \$75 per month for households on tribal lands. The program is limited to one monthly service discount per household.
- Telephone Assistance Programs are available at the state level.
 On the CenturyLink Telephone Assistance website, select your state to see information about any additional assistance programs available to you. Each state has its own application requirements, and not all states provide additional assistance.
- Lifeline is an FCC program
 designed for low-income
 consumers with affordability in
 mind. It provides subscribers a
 discount on monthly telephone
 or broadband service purchased

from participating providers. Many different phone and internet discounts for seniors are available, such as voice and broadband services, and bundled voice or broadband packages.

 Standard Lifeline — Provides federal monthly support of up to \$9.25 for qualifying broadband service. In some states, additional monthly support



is also available.

 Tribal Lifeline — Offers a monthly internet discount for seniors of up to \$34.25 per month, as well as installation assistance through the Link-Up Program to qualifying customers who live on federallyrecognized tribal lands.

Additional internet discounts for seniors

Seniors can also save on their internet bill by bundling services. With CenturyLink, you can bundle your internet and home phone for a low monthly rate with unlimited nationwide calling. Your customized bundle can include the internet you want with the home phone you need—all on one monthly bill.

Another way to save is by removing unnecessary add-ons from your bundle wherever possible. For example, you may watch more TV during the winter. In the summer months, however, you might be spending so much time outside that you don't need it. In this case, you should consider canceling your TV service and adding it back to your bundle when you'll be watching TV more frequently.

You can also save on your internet bill by determining the best internet speed for your home. This depends mainly on the size of your household and how you use the internet.  The Community Tech Network's Home Connect program, started in April 2020, helps older adults who are isolated and sheltering in place. Older Adults Technology Services (OATS) has a Senior Planet program that teaches technology to all ages nationwide in free online classes, concentrating on adults over 60 years. They are also launching an Aging Connected service to help people find low-cost internet.



Veterans' Community Project Gives Aid to Unhoused Military Vets

New Longmont Village Offers Temporary Housing to Those Who Fought for the Country

Across the world, people living without necessities like food or shelter is becoming a major issue. In Colorado alone, it is estimated that nearly 50,000 people live without proper housing.

Another shocking statistic states that military veterans make up about nine percent of the total unhoused population in the country. According to the Colorado Coalition for the Homeless, 76 percent of unhoused veterans live in a city and 54 percent have a mental or physical disability.

In recent years, cities across America have worked diligently to come up with ways to alleviate the growing problem of homelessness. Some areas have started to use "tiny homes" to help provide temporary housing for unhoused people.

For example, in November it was announced that the City of Denver purchased the first 200 tiny homes to provide shelter for 1,000 unhoused residents. Locally, the Mill Street Project in downtown Colorado Springs has acquired property and tiny homes to provide transitional housing for unhoused people between the ages of 18 and 22.

In recent years, an idea of a tiny home community in order to specifically help unhoused veterans was invented by the Veterans' Community Project (VCP) that was started by a group of combat vets in Kansas City, Missouri in 2016. The group of vets noticed a need to help their "brothers and sisters" in areas where the Veterans' Administration (VA) could not.

The group looked at several options before coming up with the idea to use tiny homes for transitional housing for unhoused veterans. The first tiny home village built specifically to provide a temporary home for vets was started in Kansas City and it still serves nearly 50 veterans.

After the project was a success, the VCP group made the decision to expand the idea to other cities across the country. Now the organization has established tiny home communities for veterans in St. Louis, MO, Sioux Falls, SD, Milwaukee, WI, Oklahoma City, OK and Longmont, CO.

Longmont's Tiny Home Village for Veterans

According to VCP Executive Director Jennifer Seybold, Longmont's VCP Outreach Center opened up in 2020 to provide a number of services to local veterans. To date, the Outreach Center has assisted 350 veterans and helped find permanent housing for 85.

After the group expanded to Longmont in 2018, a group of people in the city including city council members got together PIKES PEAK SENIOR NEWS · 10

and decided to build a tiny home village for veterans on a two acre section of land inside a new development. In 2022, the years of work paid off with the project breaking ground.

The homes were then built last year with 70 percent of the builders being resident volunteers with limited construction skills. "Anything that's not electrical, plumbing or roofing is done by community volunteers who come out and help us build," Seybold said.

The village is made for any veteran who signed the oath regardless of their discharge status. Veterans can live in the homes for a maximum of two years while the organization works with them to provide permanent housing.

Currently, the VCP Village has four homes on the property with four veterans living in them, and two more are scheduled to move in soon. "Once we are complete, we will have 21 individual units that are 240 square feet," Seybold said. "And then we will have five family units that are 320 square feet. The family units can actually sleep up to seven and those are outfitted depending on family needs."

Currently, all of the residents are men between the ages of 30 and over 60. The veterans will then get support from VCP to help them move out into a permanent housing setting.

According to Seybold, Longmont was a good choice to bring the first VCP Village to the state due to the amount of homeless veterans in the city. "I have been involved in helping the homeless for a long time," Seybold said. "Locally, I have worked in shelter services and employment services for the last 12 years or so. And a large majority of our unhoused community in Northern Colorado are veterans. Depending on the community, it is somewhere between 10 and 12 percent. That being such a large number of individuals that are being disproportionately impacted by homelessness, that is a big part of it."

Out of all of the ways to help unhoused people, VCP's method has proven to be more successful than others. "They have an awesome success number," the executive director stated. "I have worked in homelessness and social services for quite a long time and I have never seen a success rate like VCP has. VCP has an 85 percent positive transition rate and those individuals also maintain housing for the year that we do after care and check in with them."

What Country Has the Best Holiday Traditions?

Various Christmas Celebrations from Fried Chicken to Roller Skating to Throwing Shoes

Now that December is here, let's be honest, it is pretty much already Christmas. Even though the holiday officially only takes place on Dec. 25, it seems like the day is basically celebrated throughout the entire month with holiday-themed music playing everywhere and various events geared at getting into the Christmas spirit.

For centuries, Christmas in the United States has been a time to spend with friends and family while taking part in various holiday traditions. Many across the U.S. participate in nationwide traditions like having parades, Christmas tree lightings and opening presents.

Some individual families also have their own traditions they follow when celebrating the holiday. For example, some open their presents on Christmas Eve instead of Christmas Day and others strictly attend Christmas Mass at midnight every year.

In other countries, many have their own traditions that they follow. Some traditions in other countries are similar to activities that take place in the U.S., while others may

seem strange to Americans.

For example, in Caracas, Venezuela instead of piling in a car to go to Christmas Mass, there is a tradition to strap on roller skates to head to church. Venezuelans attend a morning mass every day for a week leading up to Christmas and so many people roller skate to the services that the roads are actually closed to traffic in the mornings.

And in Italy instead of Santa Clause bringing the presents himself, his helper is an old witch named La Befana. According to the legend, the three wise men invited La Befana to go with them to see baby Jesus but she told them she was too busy because




she was flying around on a broom delivering presents to children.

In fact, every country seems to have its own take on how to celebrate the holiday. The following is a list of some of the most unique ways people choose to celebrate the Christmas holiday from around the world.

Mexico

Whereas Mexico isn't that far away from the U.S., the traditions they have for the holidays differ from those to their north. In the U.S., many celebrate the holiday with

special meals like turkey or ham. However, in Mexico it is very common to have meals with tamales around the holiday season.





As most know, piñatas are commonly used to celebrate occasions like birthdays in Mexico, but they are also used during Christmas. During the holiday season,

Christmas piñatas are dressed up with extra sparkles and some even come shaped in the form of a sevenpoint star, symbolizing the seven deadly sins that are then broken by a stick to represent faith in God. The piñatas are often filled with treats like candy, peanuts, and fruits.

In the city Oaxaca, Dec. 23 is known as the Night of Radishes. People carve nativity scenes into the skins of radishes and then they are put on display for all to view.

Norway

In Norwegian folklore, it is said that witches and evil spirits come out on Christmas Eve to cause trouble. Because of this, Norwegian families hide all of the brooms and mops in their house to prevent witches from stealing them and taking a midnight ride. They also sometimes burn spruce logs in the fireplace to keep them from coming down the chimney.

Another tradition involves serving "riskrem" which is a chilled rice pudding with berry sauce for dessert. The "lady of the family" places a blanched almond inside the pudding and the family member who finds it first will get a special gift.

Thanks to a festive marketing campaign in the 1970s called "Kentucky for Christmas," fried chicken became the perfect Christmas Eve meal.

It is estimated that over three million people in Japan head to the closest Kentucky Fried Chicken to order a bucket of fried goodness for their families every year during the holiday.

Germany

In Germany, St. Nicholas varies from Santa Claus, but he is a gift giver as well. However, instead of sliding down the chimney and filling stockings, he leaves small presents like coins or fruit inside the shoes of children.

On the night before Christmas, German children leave a shoe or a boot out in front of their bedroom doors. If the children were good they get a present, if they were bad they could find a stick or twig inside it.

Germany also celebrates a tradition where an ornament in the shape of a dill pickle gets hidden deep inside the tree's branches. The first person who finds it will receive a bonus gift or good fortune for the upcoming year.

Ukraine

In Ukraine, instead of decorating Christmas trees with lights and ornaments, it gets decorated with spider webs. According to an old tale, a poor widow and her children found a Christmas tree in their garden, but the widow couldn't afford ornaments to decorate it.

Instead, she hung fruits and nuts on the tree to make her kids smile on Christmas Day. But then when the kids woke up on Christmas, it was covered by a giant spider web that shined gold and silver colors in the morning sun.

Like Americans, Ukrainians also like to celebrate the holiday with a big family meal. But in Ukraine it is common to serve 12 courses with each one dedicated to one of Jesus' apostles.

Australia and New Zealand

In the Southern Hemisphere of the world, Christmas time takes place during the summer causing traditions to vary. Instead of flying around in a sleigh, in Australia Santa Claus arrives to the shores on a surf board. People then celebrate the holiday with an outdoor barbecue.



In New Zealand instead of a Christmas tree, they celebrate with a Pohutukawa which is a native tree that produces bright red blooms during the holiday season. The flowers are seen as the official symbol for Christmas and get used on greeting cards and decorations.

Austria

In America, if children are bad they are threatened with coal in their stockings instead of gifts. But in Austria, if kids are put on the naughty list they have to worry about an old legend that says a horned half goat beast named Krampus will come and snatch bad children and put them into his wicker basket.

Many towns in Austria have special celebrations to commemorate the folktale. During Krampusnacht on December 5th, Austrians dress up as the half goat demon and parade around the streets brandishing sticks.

Sweden

In the U.S., Santa Claus is known to pull a sleigh with a team of reindeer. But according to Swedish folklore, Saint Nicholas has a companion that is a goat figure that can control and ward off the devil.

Saint Nicholas would then ride the magical goat to deliver presents. To honor the tale, people in Sweden set up giant goats made out of straw in their yards and make them to use as ornaments for the Christmas tree.

In Sweden, they also have a tradition of watching a Donald Duck television

special every Christmas Eve afternoon dating back to the 1960s. Around 40 percent of Sweden's population still gathers around the television set at 3 p.m. to watch the cartoon.

Guatemala

In Guatemala, they believe that evil spirits exist in the dark and dirty corners of a home. The week before Christmas, Guatemalans spend sweeping and collecting all of the rubbish and putting it into a big pile outside.

A figure of the devil is placed on the piles and the whole thing is burned. The "Burning of the Devil or La Quema del Diablo" helps them burn all of the bad from the previous year and start a new year from the ashes.

Czech Republic

In this eastern European country like others in the continent, Christmas is celebrated on Dec. 5 or St. Nicholas Eve. On Christmas Eve, it is a popular celebration to have a feast of fried carp. Some people buy the fish weeks before Christmas and keep them alive in their bathtubs before the feast.

On Christmas Day, it is customary for unmarried women to throw a shoe over their shoulders towards the front door. If the shoe lands with its toe towards the door, she will get married in the following year. If the shoe falls with the heel pointing towards the door, she will remain single for the next year.

Finland

Being located in the frigid northern part of the globe, many people in Finland have a sauna in their homes. In the morning on Christmas Eve, Finnish families eat a porridge made of rice and milk topped with cinnamon, milk, and butter.

At the end of the day, many of the families get into the sauna for a soak because they see it as a place to connect with their deceased ancestors. After their sauna time, they head out to celebrate Christmas Eve and the spirits of their ancestors take their place in the sauna.

Portugal

The practice is supposed to ensure good fortunes for the entire household over the next year. In some areas, Portuguese people even leave crumbs on their hearths.

Whatever the traditions may be, the general theme is to spend time with friends and family. Whether it is sharing meals or opening presents, holiday celebrations are intended to bring joy to homes before the year is over.

Our Red Barn Ranch: Educating Others on How to Live Off the Land

Calhan Ranch Offers Public Tours and Educational Sessions

When people first came to the country and then headed out west to settle, families had to live off the land. In present times, technology has changed things to where many would not know how to get food to feed their family without being able to buy it in a grocery store.

Even though there are still several ranches in Southern Colorado, it seems as if living off the land is a dying trade. However, Our Red Barn Ranch located south of Calhan offers tours to the public as they are dedicated to educating the masses about ranching and land conservation.

The ranch is open to tours by



appointment only seven days a week where people can go to see their collection of horses, chickens, llamas, alpacas, cats, dogs, two ponies and their resident pet turkey named Bertha who showed up at the ranch one day and never left. The ranch raises its own meat, vegetables, and makes clothing items.

According to ranch owner Chris Schade, one of the ranch's main focuses is to educate the public. "We get involved with the schools," Schade said. "We do a lot with Calhan public schools. Recently, I went to the District 49 career day because they were looking for somebody that wanted to talk about agriculture. So, I was there explaining to high school kids the pros and cons of agriculture. Some thought it was 'cool,' but I told them it is not always 'cool' because I have tried to call in sick and they won't answer the phone. I still have to go to the barn and feed them."

The ranch has worked with veterans, senior citizens, children and disabled people. Schade said that he recently even brought two alpacas to a dance club in Denver for a corporate event.

As a result of Schade's efforts to educate, his ranch was recognized by the El Paso County Conservation District earlier this year. The ranch was given the award of "Conservationist of the Year for Small Acreage." The ranch went on to win the award for the entire Lower Arkansas Valley Watershed District in southeastern Colorado and they are now in the running for the statewide conservationist of the year award.

The award went to a property owner who exhibited the best land conservation practices. "What got us on their radar was our outreach programs and educating the public on agriculture and being good land stewards," the ranch owner said.

It All Started with Alpacas

Schade and his wife Christiann started raising alpacas over 20 years ago when they lived in Black Forest. They were members of the Southeast Colorado Alpaca Breeders group for several years before they decided to relocate to a smaller house with more land two miles south of Calhan. The couple picked a 40-acre piece of land to start their ranch and incorporate more than just alpacas into their business model.

"When we moved out here the house and the garage were already built and they were red metal buildings," Schade recalled. "When we got here, we always wanted to get involved in agriculture tourism and educating people about livestock. Alpacas are

our mainstay and our number one focus. But, my wife said that since we were no longer doing just alpacas and with the red house and garage and the red barn we built, she wanted us to become 'Our Red Barn Ranch.'"

The ranch still has a major focus on alpacas and they also have llamas to show people the difference. The ranch also makes products out of alpaca fleece to sell.

Visitors that sign up for a tour of the ranch can shop at their "Fiber Farm Stand" alpaca store on the property or visit OurRedBarnRanch.com to purchase items online. The store has everything from stuffed alpacas to hats, gloves, sweaters, socks and more all made from alpaca fur.

Hands on Learning Experiences


According to the ranch's website, the Schade family offers a number of chances to learn "hands-on" about processing alpaca fur. Schade said that he is currently working on acquiring another building so that the ranch can complete all of the fiber processing on site.

"My wife has had groups get a hold of her that want to come learn how to spin, so she will put together an area out in the store and teach folks the basics about spinning and get them interested," Schade explained. "When we take kids out on a tour those over eight years old get to learn how to make needle-felted art."

Once a year, the ranch also invites the public out for their "Shearing Day." Every Memorial Day Weekend the alpacas get what their website calls their "day at the spa" because they not only get their hair cut or sheared, they get a pedicure (toe nail trimming), their teeth trimmed if needed and their annual vaccinations.

"We had one lady that wanted to come to an alpaca farm for her birthday," Schade remembered. "They came out in early spring and she said she wanted to come help on shearing day. Her daughter stayed with her all day and she was in a walker. She wanted to do something to help. So I put her back in a safe area where she could help open and close the gate as we were bringing the alpacas into the shearing barn. We just found a way to get her involved in it and she absolutely loved it. We try to accommodate people's needs."

Smoked Salmon Wreath

1 large fennel bulb, trimmed, core removed 3 limes 2 green shallots, trimmed 3 large ripe avocados

3 large ripe avocados250g baby cucumbers, peeled into ribbons200g (1 bunch) radishes

200g (1 bunch) radishes, trimmed, washed, thinly sliced

400g sliced smoked salmon
Extra virgin olive oil, to drizzle
Crè me fraî che, to serve
Salmon roe, to serve

- 4. Evenly sprinkle brown sugar, dried cranberries and chopped pecans overtop of the brie. Fold the corners of each pastry, just slightly over the brie.
- 5. Brush each pastry square with the beaten egg and bake for 15-20 minutes, or until the brie is melted and the pastries are golden brown.




